The Marion Koshland Science Museum of the National Academy of Sciences just opened in April 2004 and features state-of-the-art exhibitions targeted to students and adults in the general public, bringing to life the numerous studies conducted by the National Academies. The mission of the Museum is to make these studies more accessible to the public and to increase public understanding of the nature and value of science. Currently, the debut or inaugural exhibits explore the following topics:

- Putting DNA to Work

Named in memory of Marian Koshland, a member of the National Academy of Sciences and professor of Biology at the University of California, Berkeley and gifted by an endowment from her husband, former editor of *Science* and also a member of the National Academy of Sciences, it will add to the rich mix of museums in Washington. 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**JOIN THE SCI-TECH OPEN SESSION AT
WORLD LIBRARY AND INFORMATION CONGRESS:
70th IFLA General Conference and Council
August 22nd - 27th 2004, Buenos Aires, Argentina**

At IFLA 2004 Buenos Aires the Science and Technology Libraries Section will organize an open session “**Promoting scientific literacy and professional development for science librarians**”. The session will be held in Spanish with simultaneous translation. We will be hearing views from both the scientists as well as librarians in this timely and important issue. Ray Schwartz from the New Jersey Institute of Technology will serve as Moderator.

Reflections of Change in the Work of a Physicist

MARIANA WEISSMANN is an acknowledged Senior Researcher at the Argentine National Research Council in Buenos Aires, Argentina. In her presentation she will share how her life as a researcher, scientist and author has changed over the course of her career. Dra. Weissmann was awarded the L’ORÉAL-UNESCO “FOR WOMEN IN SCIENCE” prize in 2003 for her work in material sciences. Her research interest lies in the properties of solids.

Information seeking behavior of physicists

NANCY GOMEZ is the director of the exact and natural sciences library of the University of Buenos Aires, Argentina. In her presentation she will explore the work analyses and information seeking behavior of students who are in the process of getting a PhD in Physics or who have recently done so. The analysis was made utilizing the approach which is centered on the user. An attempt is made to explain situations in the seeking and use of information in terms of the sources, the criteria used to determine its relevance, organizational strategies as well as information presentation strategies. The study also looks at the physicists’ feelings during the information seeking process and the way the idea of information evolves in their minds throughout their PhD.

Professional librarianship 2004: development, transitions and partnerships

CAMILA ALIRE is Dean of Library Services at the University of New Mexico. Professor Camila Alire will give us a view of the library from an administrator's vantage point. Dr. Alire has an extensive record of experience as the head of various academic libraries and has published widely. She is well versed in all aspects of library & information management and technology and has served in leadership roles with the American Library Association ALA and has just won election as President-elect of the Association for College and Research Libraries (ACRL).

NEWS FROM MEMBER LIBRARIES

Bibliothèque Nationale de France active in promoting science

Digitization

The Bibliothèque Nationale de France, BnF, the national library of France has been active in making science visible by digitizing old collections and enhancing access to these collections. The server Gallica of the national library BnF is dedicated to digitized materials <http://gallica.bnf.fr/>

In mathematics the co-operation between the French network of libraries is showing impressive results as books and periodicals are being digitized (please see Pierre Bérard's paper from SciTech section Open session at IFLA Glasgow 2002 <http://www.ifla.org/IV/ifla68/papers/095-112e.pdf>). Within the framework of this co-operation the BnF server Gallica is linked with NUMDAM, the Digitization of Ancient Mathematics Documents program and Cellule

MathDoc, the joint institute on scientific information and communication of the Centre National de la Recherche Scientifique–CNRS and Université Joseph Fourier, Grenoble.

Recently, BnF was responsible for the digitization of the famous card catalogue regarding mathematics, the Répertoire bibliographique des sciences mathématiques (RBSM). The catalogue, which contains 20 000 references to international works dating from 1894 to 1912 can now be accessed online from the website of Cellule MathDoc <http://math-doc.ujf-grenoble.fr/RBSM/>. Other partners in this effort included the Archives H. Poincaré (CNRS/University of Nancy 2) who took part in the optical character recognition process.

The LINUM (LIVres NUMérisés de Mathématique) online catalogue of digitized books

in mathematics brings together the four major servers of digitized books in the field of mathematics. The LINUM brings together books from University of Cornell (USA), University of Michigan (USA), State and University Library Göttingen (Germany), and the Bibliothèque Nationale de France. Furthermore, the service links the catalogues of digital scientific papers from the German historical Königlichen Preußischen Akademie der Wissenschaften, the Polish Biblioteka Wirtualna Matematyki, and the National Library of Portugal. <http://math-doc.ujf-grenoble.fr/LiNuM/>


The Bibliothèque Nationale de France has also digitized periodicals in co-operation with special and university libraries. Together with the Museum national d'Histoire Naturelle in Paris the following three periodicals have recently been digitized:

- Bulletin de la Société Les naturalistes parisiens (n°1 1904 – n°15 1933),
- Bulletin de la Société botanique de France (t.1 1854 – t.46 1899), and
- Bulletin de la Société philomatique de Paris (n°1 1791 – n°96 an 13, t.4 1814 – t. 10 1833).

The growing periodical collections in science will be soon accessible via Gallica: <http://gallica.bnf.fr/>.

BnF Exhibitions

At the moment BnF is preparing a major exhibition on the subject of the sea, entitled *La mer, terreur et fascination* together with a pool of documentation and research centers on oceanology from Brest (on west coast of France). Previous exhibitions in this series of exhibitions from the BnF departments of science and technology and maps have focused on the sky (*Figure du ciel*) and the earth (*Couleurs de la terre*). *La mer, terreur et fascination* will present the sea element through a scientific, artistic and imaginary approach. Exhibition materials include manuscripts, illuminations, engravings, maps, literary and scientific texts, paintings, musical works, audiovisual workstations and films. The time span ranges from the 13th century to present-day materials. The exhibition will open at the BnF in October 2004 and it is scheduled to continue until January 2005. Another chance to see this great exhibition will be in Brest from May to July 2005.

BnF Seminars

The BnF conferences and seminars are an important part of the library activities. In December 2003, Professor Jean-Pierre Changeux, (Collège de France and Institut Pasteur) who is a researcher in neurobiology held a very successful series of three seminars at BnF on the subject of cerebral mechanisms involved in knowledge acquisition. The possibilities of research in neurosciences regarding issues such as moral judgment and moral norms were discussed. The seminars also investigated how neurobiology can explain the sense of beauty and creation in art.

Other highlights of IFLA 2004 in Buenos Aires

Olga Lavrik, member of the Science and Technology Libraries Standing Committee is putting into practice IFLA President Kay Raseroka's plea made in Glasgow 2002 regarding interaction between sections and especially with those representing the developing countries of IFLA VIII Division of Regional Activities. In Buenos Aires Olga Lavrik will give a presentation in the Asia and Oceania section Open Session "**Information Literacy for a knowledge society in Asia and Oceania**".

In her presentation on Wednesday, Aug. 25th Olga, who comes from Novosibirsk, will explore information literacy issues from a Siberian perspective.
